This ambitious pair took on the challenge of traveling the Great Western trail, which stretches across the middle of the USA, going from the Canadian border all the way to the Mexican

cross country trip with GPS coordinates, maps, and a wealth of information for their nine-month trek. Originally, they had intended to travel only from Canada to the Mexican border. Once they arrived at the border area, they extended their trek even further. They then set out on another journey abourd their pair of Polaris X2 ATVs, with their tent trailer in tow. They traveled all

the way from the U.S. southern border with Mexico, clear to the tip of the Baria peninsula at Cabo San Lucas. After enjoying the sunny climes of Cabo, they climbed back abound their steeds and headed back to the American border. In the process, they racked up an additional 3000 miles to their 6000-mile Cross Country trip!

Having met this adventurous cou-



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ple and listened to the many highlights of their ATV adventuring I was envious. Imagine being able to drop everything you're doing, take nine months off from your job, and then explore the country on a quad?

Certainly a fair number of serious ATVers might be interested in doing something like this. The reality of actually doing it, though, is altogether different. After hearing all the detailed preparation, multi-day practice runs, and careful thought and planning that went into Marc and France's trip, it became clear that this couple lives and breathes off-road adventuring.

They clearly display the outdoors spirit and determination that must have existed in the first off-road explorers, the early settlers who rode in wagon trains. These hardy individuals traveled a long and hard trip aboard provision-stuffed wagon trains, braving the elements, the terrain, and hostile natives along the way. Well, thankfully, Marc and France did not have to battle the local Native Americans, except to avoid the casino parking lots located on the tribal lands they journeyed through.

Embarking on an adventure like this is certainly not for everyone. Only the most determined and well planned-out expedition could hope to accomplish what this couple has in the course of nine months of ATV riding and exploring.

The payoff? Marc and France have, to our knowledge, set a new record for a continuous ATV journey. Racking up 92/5 miles while discovering the majesty, beauty, and differing peoples of both the USA and Mexico has given them some of the most enrichening experiences in their lives.

They now have numerous memories and stories of the different people they met along the way. People who reached out and helped and encouraged them in their journey. Like me, they were all a bit jealous of the fact that Marc and France were actually doing what we only wish we could, an ATV expedition of record proportions. What this teaches us all, is that every journey begins with the first step. All-terrain vehicles are a great way to experience the people, places and terrain that make this sport challenging, yet satisfying, on so many levels. The next time you are planning an extended ATV ride, remember to follow in Marc and France's lead and take the time to enjoy the view. Ride on. D
